# Infant and Early Childhood Mental Health (IECMH)

**IECMH** (social-emotional development) is *the developing capacity of young children to...* 

- experience, manage, and express emotions;
- form close and secure relationships; and
- explore the environment and learn

...all in the context of family, community, and culture.

# Early Brain Growth & IECMH

- The early years are an amazing window of opportunity
- 1 million new neural connections are formed every second over the first few years of life
- Early life experiences set the foundation for our brain architecture

• "...the connections that form early provide either a strong or weak foundation for the connections that form later."

Traumatic experiences can hinder development and may lead to mental health challenges in the future. The Safe Babies approach is driven by a vision of prevention, where systems work together to strengthen the family, putting the need to protect and build safe, stable and nurturing early relationships at the center of child welfare decision-making.

### The Safe Babies Approach

Safe Babies, a program of ZERO TO THREE, meets the needs of babies and toddlers under court jurisdiction by implementing a team-based approach. rooted in the science of early childhood development, to ignite collective action across states and communities.

IMPACT: Safe Babies focuses on the urgent developmental needs of young children during all planning and decision-making to strengthen early relationships with parents and caregivers and to create safe, stable, and nurturing environments for babies and toddlers.

The Safe Babies approach is guided by five areas of focus, with the needs of babies and their parents at the center. The approach works concurrently, at both the Child and Family Level and the State and Site Level, to ensure healthy childhood development while impacting long-term capacity building.

Program of ZERO TO THREE

#### Continuous Quality Improvement

Driving and sustaining best practices to foster reflection instead of reactivity, allowing the space for families and professionals to grow, adapt, and change based on effective data and evaluation

#### Interdisciplinary Collaborative and Proactive Teamwork

Ensuring families' individualized needs are addressed by promoting coordination across communities to find creative solutions and remove structural barriers that perpetuate discriminatory processes and inequities

#### Enhanced Oversight and Collaborative Problem-Solving

Enhancing judicial oversight with more frequent court hearings and engaging families as partners guided by respect. kindness, and compassion


#### Expedited, Appropriate, and Effective Services

Ensuring services for babies and their families are timely and comprehensive while respecting their lived experiences and the intergenerational effects of social, racial, and health inequities

#### Trauma-Responsive Support

Responding to trauma with a healing approach while recognizing the resilience of parents and understanding the lifelong. systemic social and health inequities facing some families with young children








### **SBCT Approach: Areas of Focus**



Building community partnerships that increase coordination, alignment and integration of services and supports




# **The Family Team & Family Team Meetings**

# Georgia Thrive: A Family Strengthening Program

#### **Mission:**

Georgia seeks to improve the well-being of families and young children by strengthening the system of care, transforming courts, closing the pipelines to child welfare system involvement, and eliminating racial disparities with the goal of achieving a safe, permanent home to grow and thrive.

#### Lay translation:

We bring together partners to support young children and their families who face court or child-welfare involvement so each will have a safe, stable home to grow and thrive.

#### Vision:

To establish a well-coordinated child welfare and court system that provides trauma-responsive and culturally competent services to young children and their families resulting in safe stable communities where individuals thrive.

### **HRSA-Funded Georgia Infant-Toddler Court Project**

\$3 million across 5 years

For statewide and local site planning and implementation 3 local sites funded

With 1/3 of the grant's funds supporting local site implementation and trainings National technical assistance

From Zero to Three and HRSA to help build state-level leadership and infrastructure

# Project Goal

To improve Georgia's statewide systems and policies to support young children (ages 0-3) and their families who are involved, or at risk of involvement, with the child welfare system, and build capacity to prevent child maltreatment more broadly.

# **Project Objectives**

Establish leadership capacity	in Georgia to inform ITC implementation through the creation and training of a state-level ITC leadership team. The leadership team will include state-level partners, local leaders, and families with lived experience.	
Develop a state action plan	to guide ITC implementation in the state through a systematic process led by the state-level ITC leadership team and involving the ITC National Resource Center, relevant stakeholders, and families with lived experience.	
Increase capacity through training	of state and local partners in the ITC approach and topics related to the developmental health, mental health, and wellbeing of very young children.	
Establish local capacity for ITC implementation	by establishing three local ITC sites through a Request for Applications process informed by the state action plan, ITC leadership team and families with lived experience.	
Improve child and family outcomes	during and after child welfare and/or court involvement demonstrated through collection and evaluation of program outcomes data at the 3 local ITC sites. (Process & Outcome Evaluation)	
Establish sustainability and scaling plan	utilizing evaluation data and learnings from implementation to inform sustainability and future scaling of the model across Georgia. (Implementation & Sustainability Evaluation)

Local ITC sites will be selected through a Request for Applications process based on criteria developed by the ITC Leadership Team. Sites will receive funding for at least 3 years at \$60,000 per year and receive technical assistance from the COE and National TA Center. Local ITC Site 1: Site Coordinator Data Support

Local ITC Site 2: Site Coordinator Data Support

Local ITC Site 3: Site Coordinator Data Support

**GA-AIMH Training Team** 

GA-AIMH will be the training provider for the project. They will help build local site capacity to serve families with young children in developmentally appropriate ways.

**Center of Excellence for Children's Behavioral Health** 

The COE will provide leadership, backbone, &

evaluation support to the ITC project, including a full-time project coordinator.

# **Project Timeline**

### Year 1

Planning and development of leadership team, statewide action plan, and RFA for local sites

## Years 2-5

**Implementation** of statewide action plan, funding of 3 local sites, and evaluation of project activities.

Year 2: Local sites 1 & 2 identified

Year 3: Local site 3 identified

All local sites will be funded for at least 3 years.

We will have 5 key documents to guide our work

- Disparity Impact Statement
- State Action Plan
- Request for Applications for Local Sites
  - Sustainability Plan
- Evaluation Plan

These will be living documents and will be reviewed annually and updated as needed to address changes in implementation.

# By the end of Year 1...

### Infant Toddler Court Programs keep babies and their families at the center by...

- Advocating for frequent, quality family time
- Incorporating the voices of people with lived experience
- Raising awareness for the unique developmental needs of infants and toddlers
- Training agents of change and community members
